The Face of Hope

So often we concentrate on the "face of poverty." But what does the face of hope look like? It would likely be that of Franjessica Whitsett.

Franjessica Whitsett, a Head Start mother, recently earned her bachelor's degree in nursing from the University of Saint Francis. While in school, Franjessica was assigned to do height and weight checks at the CANI Head Start site at Hanna-Creighton, as part of her nursing clinicals. She was impressed with the curriculum and environment and later enrolled her son, now 4, in the program.

CANI Head Start meets educational, health, nutritional, and social service needs of low-income preschool children, ages 3 to 5, and their families in Allen, Noble, and Whitley counties. Upon enrollment, every family in the Head Start program is assigned a Family Advocate. Among other things, the Family Advocate is charged with helping families navigate through the social service system, find local resources and provide support.

Family Advocate Barb Brice was assigned to Franjessica and her family last summer. Franjessica said Barb is kind and has taught her how to connect to valuable resources. This skill, she said, should not be underestimated:

"Don't give up...utilize your resources," she said. "There's a lot out there and people can help you."

It seems Barb derives just as much satisfaction as the families who are on the receiving end.

"This is what Head Start is about," she said about helping families become self-sufficient. "The biggest asset is the information we provide."

That information has translated into seven Head Start parents earning their GEDs this year. It's that personal contact that makes the difference at the end of the day.

Speaking of making a difference – Franjessica plans to continue her schooling and become a pediatric nurse. However,

life is pretty busy at the moment, as she recently became engaged. She and her finance plan to move to Delaware this summer for his job and Franjessica will enroll in a master's program there.

HPRP GETS HIGH MARKS

Well-run programs can mean better outcomes for clients. CANI is proud to tout some recent news related to quality: the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program (HPRP) was ranked among the top agencies in the state by the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority (IHCDA.)

Every quarter, IHCDA submits an HPRP progress report to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which reports on family, and expenditure activity, as well as housing outcomes of the participating families. This data provides information on the impact of the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-housing Program. CANI scored an overall grade of 94 percent. This score is the sum of several areas including accuracy and completeness in reporting and housing outcomes.

So what does this mean for the families and the community? HPRP combines housing assistance, along with case management to educate families on how to break the cycle of homelessness. HPRP is currently one funding source for CANI's Family Development program, which is a holistic approach to helping families over-

come poverty. Family Development is a voluntary, in-home program of supportive services that helps identify family strengths, desires, and needs.

Finding and maintaining safe and affordable housing is one of the first steps on the road to self-sufficiency. Family Development Services Workers work hand-in-hand with clients to make this happen. HPRP is based on a two-pronged approach, with 65 percent of the focus on rapid rehousing and 35 percent concentrated on homelessness prevention. CANI has worked with several local agencies like Charis House, Interfaith Hospitality Network, Fort Wayne Rescue Ministries, YWCA, 211, Vincent Villages, Pathfinders, and numerous others within the region on homeless concerns.

A three-year program, CANI has participated in HPRP since October 2009. To date, 215 families have received assistance in Adams, Allen, DeKalb, Huntington, LaGrange, Noble, Wells, Steuben and Whitley counties, what IHCDA considers "Region 3."

Family Development Manager John Robb said the timing was right for a program

like HPRP, "because people are losing jobs and not being able to pay rent." Quality and affordable housing is hard to find. HPRP is a beacon of hope for people in need.

"It can give people a fresh start and put them back on their feet." he said.


CANI Head Start is a free, comprehensive development program. It meets educational, health, nutritional, and social service needs of low-income preschool children, ages 3 to 5, and their families in Allen, Noble, and Whitley counties. To qualify, families must be at or below 100 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, with an exception that 10 percent may be enrolled who are considered over-income.

LITERACY ALLIANCE AND CANI OPEN DOORS

Reading is a skill many of us take for granted. But what if you're illiterate? How can you apply for a job if you simply can't read the application? Locally, the Literacy Alliance of Fort Wayne provides hope for people who struggle with reading.


The Literacy Alliance collaborates with several organizations, including CANI, to provide literacy classes at various sites in Fort Wayne. The Family Literacy partnership began in 1999 helping 30 families at CANI's Head Start site at St. Peter's Catholic Church. The program moved to the CANI Head Start site at Hanna-Creighton in the fall of 2004. Fort Wayne Community Schools contributes funding for certified teachers at each site.

A CANI Family Advocate (FA) is the liaison between the Literacy Alliance and the families. The FA recruits and enrolls CANI Head Start families to participate in this voluntary program. Additionally, the FA facilitates a class twice a week, that is taught by a teacher from Fort Wayne Community Schools. The teacher works with the family on language skills, ultimately

working towards earning a GED.

The Family Literacy model includes four components: GED or English Language instruction for parents; an education program for their children (in this case Head Start); Parent and Child (PAC) time where the parents spend time in their child's classroom learning how to support their child's learning; and parent time with discussion about parenting skills, nutrition, community resources, and more.

So who are the families in this program? Many are Burmese or Hispanic, but a great deal are native English speakers. One common denominator is their need for better language skills. Pre and post assessments track their progress, or "gains" which can be astonishing at times. Case in point: Khin Htwe, a Taiwanese immigrant recently earned her citizenship with the help of the Family Literacy pro-

gram. To date, more than 400 families have participated.

CANI Head Start Director Mary Lee Freeze is a big proponent of the program. She said she appreciates the "all encompassing" nature and approach. It is an asset to the Head Start program because it addresses the roots causes and conditions of poverty.

"If we help the parents, we help the (Head Start) children," she said.

Low- and moderate-income Allen County residents claimed approximately \$2.5 million in tax credits this year, thanks to the Free Tax Preparation (EITC) Program coordinated by United Way of Allen County and the Volunteer Center @ RSVP. This is a 19 percent increase over last year's \$2.1 million. A total of 1,587 area residents received free tax assistance provided by dozens of IRS trained and certified tax volunteers. CANI is a member of the Financial Stability Partnership and a site for the free tax preparation.

HOMEOWNERSHIP WITHIN REACH WITH CANI PROGRAM

Homeownership is a slice of the American Dream. Thanks to a CANI program, one local woman is now among the 74 million homeowners in the United States.

renovation of two foreclosed homes located

Monroeville native Ashley
Hankins was in the market for a
house when she came across the
home for sale on Tanglewood
Drive in New Haven. She inquired
with the real estate agent, learned

about CANI's involvement and soon she was on the road to becoming a homeowner.

After determining that Ashley qualified for a mortgage, CANI staff worked with her to iron out the details. April 1, 2011 was the big day. She and her son moved into a completely renovated three-bedroom ranch style home, complete with new appliances and flooring. Now, a few months later the house is

starting to feel like a home, with furniture and décor. She said her favorite part of the house is the three-season porch. She also likes the quiet and safe neighborhood and that there are several children who could be playmates for her son.

Ashley said that while her monthly mortgage payment is higher than her previous rent, she has resolved to save more money by eliminating unnecessary expenses. CANI IDA Coordinator Andrea Young works with her on budgeting and assisted her with the prepurchase homeownership counseling. Ashley shared her dream of

going back to school once she's more financially secure.

CANI hopes to make homeownership possible for more residents in northeast Indiana. The home at 211 Sara Drive in New Haven is still for sale. Also, the agency has plans to purchase, renovate and resell other homes in northeast Indiana.
